As you read this, a Global Action trip to Borneo and a visit to China are inspiring personal growth and cross-cultural understanding, while the dedication of pupils and staff to teaching Afghani girls and Ukrainian students online speaks volumes about our values of compassion and service. The Charity Committee has also worked tirelessly, not only raising significant funds for vital causes but also furthering the vision of Fundación Runnymede – opening doors to UK university education for talented students in our local community.

Success in sport has also been a highlight this term, with pupils emerging as overall champions in several inter-schools athletics competitions including a standout performance from Mateo G in Year 9" who ran 100m in a remarkable 11.23 seconds.




Year 10 Enrichment Week

Gold Duke of Edinburgh

Twenty-four Yr12 participants and two teachers travelled to Snowdonia and returned safely on Sunday 8th June after successfully completing their Gold Award qualifying expedition.

The Gold Award is the highest level of the DofE programme – a personal development scheme that encourages young people to challenge themselves, build new skills, and gain confidence. To achieve the Gold Award, participants complete five sections: Volunteering, a Physical Activity, a Skill, a Residential and an Expedition. For many, the Gold expedition is often seen as the most exciting and memorable part of the award.

This year the Runnymede Gold Expedition took place in Snowdonia National Park, Wales. To prepare, pupils had to plan their expedition including learning map skills, camp craft and first aid. The expedition was four days and three nights and pupils had to carry their own kit including tents and equipment, cook for themselves and navigate their route using a map and compass. They also tackled tough terrain, relentless rain, and an army of midges with real resilience. After a challenging start, they were rewarded with some sunshine and stunning views — and throughout it all, they showed impressive determination and teamwork.

Following the expedition pupils embarked on a sightseeing trip to Liverpool. They visited the Beatles Experience, went on a historic walking tour and enjoyed a celebratory dinner together. The pupils were fantastic throughout the trip, even when the weather was less kind! Well done to all of them.

We would also like to say a huge thank you to Mr Hornshaw. After setting up the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme at Runnymede he has overseen its operation for many years. Under his guidance it has gone from strength to strength. For many Runnymedians their memories of DofE are one of the real highlights of their time at the school, and this is down to him. Thank you Mr Hornshaw for your leadership, guidance and for leaving us this legacy as you embark on your own next adventure.






Art Exhibition —

Congratulations to the Class of 2025. We are proud of all you have achieved, and we look forward to seeing where your journeys take you next.








Take a Runnymedian to Work Day
